


This first edition did not linger long in the market as Blomfield released a second edition within the same year with a different preface in reply to William Robinson's forceful essay 'Garden Design and the Architects' Garden'. Bookplate of Duke de Moro (Moro Philips, 1847-1921). Philips was a wealthy American and 'eccentric' of Polish descent who reclaimed a supposed title. Settled at Hill Hall near Epping, Essex whose park was done by Humphry Repton. (Carter) \$110.00






A nice copy of one of the most important gardening books of its era. Robinson entered into a steaming debate with Reginald Blomfield and F. Inigo Thomas after their book "The Formal Garden in England" appeared earlier in the year. \$250.00

The relationship between Edwin Lutyens and Gertrude Jekyll produced some the most beautiful and celebrated gardens of the Edwardian era. This heavily illustrated, large folio copy includes many contemporary photographs of their collaborations as well as images of Lutyens' independent architectural commissions. Many pictures were shot by Charles Latham, the renowned Country Life magazine photographer who chronicled the era's built environment with unmatched skill. \$775.00
